

# 1894 copy of Williston letter

so close to the enemy that their shells all  
fell far over us - Planting three guns of  
the battery in this position. when it swept the  
Enemy heavy blows - Lieutenant Williston moved  
one of his brass 12-pouncers on to the  
skirmish line: in fact the line was moved  
to the front to allow him to get an eligible  
position - when he remained with his gun  
in the face of the strengthened Enemy (who  
advanced to its very muzzle) dealing  
death and destruction in their ranks  
with double loads of canister -
