THE WAR FRONTS

EASTERN FRONT: For the first time since the start of the Russo-German war on June 22, 1941, the Red Army drove the enemy back over a border of the Soviet Union. The Second Ukrainian Army advanced to the Prut River frontier of Rumania on a front more than 50 miles long stretching northwest from Skulyany. This town lies within ten miles of the rail junction of Jassy, inside Rumania. The Berlin radio reported that Red Army units crossed the Prut River and assaulted Jassy.

At the same time it was announced that Soviet troops overwhelmed the German garrison at Nikolaev and struck southwest across the flat country toward Odessa, 75 miles away.

Nikolaev was the enemy's last Black Sea port east of Odessa and a point of great consequence for communication to the region by rail has been practically eliminated. From the north, south and west the town is surrounded by water barriers and the Soviets described the entire district to the east as one mass of trenches surrounded by rows of barbed wire entanglements and saturated with firing points. In the direction from which the town was accessible to tanks the Germans had set up deep anti-tank ditches and laid mine fields.

During this action a crossing of the Bug was made sixty miles north of Nikolaev and this force joined others striking toward Odessa.
